

Community Flu Shot Clinic Planned

IRONWOOD – As the 2013-14 flu season looms, local health partners are once again planning a community vaccination clinic.

Western U.P. Health Department, Aspirus Grand View Hospital, Iron County Wisconsin Health Department, and the Gogebic Community College School of Nursing will provide flu shots at a fast, convenient vaccination clinic, Saturday September 21st from 9-11am at the college's Lindquist Center Gymnasium.

"When residents attend this clinic they not only receive their annual flu shot, but they also assist local healthcare partners with exercising emergency plans," said Zona Wick, the Iron County health officer. "The collaboration of three health care organizations as well as local nursing students offers a quick and efficient vaccination experience."

Annual flu shots are recommended for everyone 6 months and older. Certain groups including: young children, those over the age of 65, pregnant women, and individuals with asthma, diabetes, and chronic lung conditions are at greatest risk of flu related complications.

"Getting an annual flu vaccine is still the single best strategy to prevent flu and to stay healthy during the coming flu season. Vaccination protects you, your family and your neighbors because when more of us are vaccinated, less flu circulates within the community." said Western U.P. Health Department Medical Director, Dr. Terry Frankovich.

Flu Shots will cost \$25 per person, with no charge to clients who present a current Medicare or Medicaid card. Many children qualify for free or reduced rates through the Vaccines for Children program. Those with private insurance will be given receipts and billing forms to submit for reimbursement. Drive thru service will be available for those with limited mobility.

On July 13, 2013 the Postal Service issued the New England Coastal Lighthouses Forever stamp. Solitary and mysterious, lighthouses have fascinated people for centuries. Celebrating the eternal appeal of these historic beacons, the U.S. Postal Service continues its popular series of lighthouse stamps. Sought after by collectors and beloved by the public, this sixth issuance in the series celebrates New England Coastal Lighthouses.

There are five different lighthouses from five states displayed in this particular stamp series. The Portland Head is Maine's oldest lighthouse and has been listed in the National Register of Historic Places since 1973. The Portsmouth Harbor was created in 1771 and was New Hampshire's first navigational aid. Point Judith's light house was built in 1857 and was originally established in 1810 to guard a very dangerous part of the Atlantic Coast of Rhode Island. New London Harbor is Connecticut's oldest and tallest lighthouse that was originally established in 1761 and was financed by a lottery held by the Connecticut colonial legislature. The Boston Harbor lighthouse is the only remaining American lighthouse with a resident keeper employed by the federal government and was designated a National Historic Landmark in 1964.




Celebrating 45 Years

NATURE NOTES • Frost by Peter Dring

Peter Dring is a naturalist, photographer, and was Director of the world renowned Little Red Schoolhouse Nature Center for nearly four decades.

In warm weather, on calm clear nights, the surface of the earth quickly cools as it radiates its heat up to the sky. Heavy cold air settles into every valley and depression. This surface layer of air becomes further cooled to the point where, if it is damp and the earth moist, it must lose some of its moisture and this is deposited on plants and other objects near the ground as "dew".

Under conditions otherwise favorable for dew but when the temperature goes below the freezing point, hoar frost forms. In late fall and early spring it usually appears as a white coating of fine ice needles, spine-like or feathery and sometimes as tiny flat six-sided flakes resembling snow crystals. Grass, weeds, shrubs and trees will be silvered with a delicate fur of frost. Sometimes when the air is too dry or windy for hoar frost to form but the temperature falls several degrees below 32 F., we have a "black frost" so called because many plants freeze and lat-

er turn black and limp when they are thawed out by the sun. Frost damage to a plant is not ordinarily caused by the frost crystals themselves, but by the freezing of the plant juices.

Frost helps keep soils loose and crumbly. Frost also plays an important part in splitting rocks and causing them to disintegrate into fine particles which, carried by wind and water, become part of the soil.

Windowpane patterns of frost, on a bitterly cold morning are beautiful, unique and never the same. With a good imagination you can see funny faces, beautiful landscapes, fairy castles or forests of towering ferns. Geometrical designs, a spider's web, tiny blossoms and leaves, or an intricate lace may be etched in gossamer lines that sparkle in the sunlight. Try blowing on such a frosty pane until your breath melts the crystals into a film of water, then move back and watch the frost reform a new design. The air in the room should be moist and various combinations of temperature and moisture affect the formation of the frost crystals, they also can be affected by the thickness of the glass, its structure and cleanliness

Friends and family became interested in the work and soon Jerry was selling them in retail outlets and his first showing was in Eagle River at the Olson Memorial Library as Artist for the Month in August 2013.

Quilt artist, Terry Simeone is a resident of Land O' Lakes. While raising her family and being a homeschooling teacher, Terry was able to explore many art forms

while formatting educational workshops for other local homeschooling families. In more recent years she has focused on the art of quilting. Terry Simeone grew up in the northwest suburbs of Chicago and has lived in Land O' Lakes since 1987. Before moving here, she and her husband Bob lived and traveled in South America, working first in the Peace Corps in Paraguay and later working on a sustainable forestry project with indigenous communities in the Amazonian region of Peru. Terry's other artistic studies include dance and yoga. She



studied dance and psychology in college, and later received certification as a yoga teacher, specializing in yoga therapy. She has taught group and private yoga classes in Land O' Lakes since 2003. She is also a folk dance caller and has led dances for many local community events.

That simple act of feeling the clay and water together and then being able to make functional art, was all it took to get her to enroll in pottery classes. Her first classes were with area potters in Berea, Kentucky. She was also taught by the artists at Arrowmont School for the Arts in Gatlinburg, TN. Rita has been studying this traditional craft for over 12 years now. Rita creates functional pottery to enjoy in the home. Although she has exhibited her work, Rita's career as a teacher follows through with her art. She delights in teaching this craft and now she is asking others to try their hand at the



wheel. Demonstrating and giving others the opportunity to feel the fascinating exploration of clay and water fuels Rita to continue this ancient process but with an artist's eye. With her husband, Steve, Rita moved to Land O' Lakes in 2010. When not at her wheel, Rita continues to substitute teach in area schools and is a volunteer at the Land O' Lakes Library. She is also involved in the traditional art of folk dancing with her husband, who does calling for the dances.
