35th Three Bear Sled Dog Race & Midwest American Championships

This season's heavy snows and cold temperatures have created ideal conditions for the 35th running of the Three Bear Sled Dog Races in Land O' Lakes on the weekend of February 6th, 7th and 8th. The Three Bear Sled Dog Race has also been chosen as the Midwest American Championship venue, which means that the event has been expanded from previous years with qualifying races on Friday added to the traditional Saturday & Sunday racing schedule.

Many Wisconsin mushers agree the Three Bear Race trail is one of their favorite race locations. Racing in both Upper Michigan and Northern Wisconsin, the Three Bear offers beautiful well-groomed trails. It is perfect for the Midwest American Championships because it has the right combination of fast sections and more technical sections. The dogs do best with a variable trail: the more technical sections give the drivers a chance to use their sled driving skills while the faster sections give the dogs a chance to turn on the speed.

The teams will run through forested trails starting from the Town Hall grounds in downtown Land O' Lakes. The races are hosted by the local Three Bear Sled Dog Races and Games committee and organized by the Wisconsin Trailblazers Sled Dog Club. The races are sanctioned by the International Sled Dog Racing Association (ISDRA)with competitors vying for points toward year-end medals. The points system is similar to NASCAR in that top-placing teams will earn a significant number of points. You will most likely see some fierce racing at the Championship.

Racers from around the Midwest and across the country come to race in a variety of divisions including 3-dog, 4-dog, 6-dog and unlimited team sizes. Some racers don't even use a sled! Those racers skijor which has a racer on cross country skis pulled by one to three dogs.

This event is not just for the competitors.

A big difference between this race and a NASCAR race is spectators will be allowed in the "pits". Mushers encourage people to walk through the Musher's Village dog yard parking area to schmooze with their dogs and ask questions. Unlike NASCAR there will be no entrance or parking fee to attend the sled dog races. Spectators are appreciated with excellent viewing areas set up along the courses and at the start and finish areas on the grounds of the Land O' Lakes Town Hall on County Highway B.

Adding to the races, the Land O' Lakes community has planned a variety of outdoor games and activities. The very popular children's Mutt Race will have registration at noon on Saturday & Sunday with racing starting at 1:00 pm. Children are welcome to bring their own dogs from home to race in a 50-yard dash. Thanks to the generosity of a local dog lover there will also be dogs available for those who can't bring their own. A harness and sled are provided. There is no entry fee for this timed event and prizes are awarded. Note that this year there will be a special prize for the fastest Mutt Racer using their own amateur sled dog.

At 2:00 pm on Saturday spectators can enter their pets in the Fido Fashion Show. The competition has separate categories for dogs dressed by children and those prepared by adults. Contestants will walk or "parade" their dogs while judges and spectators watch. Judges continued on page 4 >>



OUTSIDE • Fishing & Snow

Report for the Eagle River Chamber of Commerce based on Creative Brilliance interviews with Eagle River guides "Muskie Matt" of Wild Eagle Lodge, "Ranger Rick" Krueger of Guide's Choice Pro Shop, Mat Hegy; and Eagle River hunting enthusiast, Dan Anderson.

VILAS COUNTY: FISHING REPORT

Northern and panfish putting on a good to excellent bite, with walleye good, and some largemouths being caught incidentally, as well; all in the Eagle River, Wisconsin area

Ice conditions in the Eagle River, Wisconsin area are improving with the dropping temperatures, but there is still slush in some areas. Ice thickness varies from 6-14 inches. Best way to get out is to use a snowmobile or ATV. A few trucks are going out, but one of our guide sources tells us that he would not yet take his truck out on the ice, as there are plenty of "iffy" spots still around. We continue to urge all of you to come up to Eagle River and have a lot of fun, catch fish, and do it in safety. Best way to get this done is to hire one of Eagle River's excellent guides.

NORTHERN: Fish 10 feet of water or less in and around remaining weeds. Use a medium to large shiner or northern sucker under a tip up. Place your bait right above the top of the weeds. All day action and the bite is good to excellent.

PANFISH: Crappies, bluegills and perch are locating in two areas. Fish break edges and adjacent weeds in 10 feet of water or less, or try main lake mudflats in 15-35 feet of water. The perch are tight to bottom, with the crappies and gills suspending mainly in the lower half of the water column. Use a waxie, spike, wiggler or crappie minnow, or micro-plastic on a small jig or under a slip bobber. All day action and the bite is good to excellent.

WALLEYE: Fish break edges in 6-35 feet of water. The walleyes are tight to bottom. Use a medium shiner or walleye sucker under a tip up, or try a jigging spoon tipped with a minnow head. Place your bait about a foot off the bottom. All day action, with peaks in the evening. The bite is good.

LARGEMOUTH BASS: There are a few incidental largemouth bass being caught by walleye and northern anglers. Best areas to get the largemouth to hit are with the

shallow setups in 10-15 feet of water off of weed edges or over weed beds.

SNOW REPORT

Trails are in very good early riding condition, and approaching excellent! Trails are being constantly groomed.

The base is hard as a rock with new snow continuing, which means a smooth cover. Temperatures remain very cold.

The traffic this past week was lighter than the thousands of sleds we welcomed over the Holidays. Our groomers continue to work all the rough, frozen areas. Some sections are getting numerous passes to cut and smooth out the bumps and roughness. Trails near Eagle River are getting an amazing amount of traffic. Just know that the trails are being groomed every night!

The pile of sweaty skiing and outdoor clothes in my closet had begun to smell a little rank, as polypro is inclined to do. So I hoisted the laundry basket and schlepped it down two flights of stairs. In the corner of the last step, something small and dark, about the size of a nickel, caught my eye. "Thunk" went the laundry as I crouched down to get a better look. Sure enough, a brown spider crouched among the dust bunnies and dog hairs.

Now, I know that this type of discovery elicits a wide variety of responses in people, and the majority probably lean toward some combo of screaming and smashing. But I'm at the other end of the spectrum. It's been hard to "see" nature lately, since I spend most daylight hours in the office. As a result, I've been feeling a little deprived of my usual encounters with wildlife, so I felt honored to have some nature living in my stairwell. I ran up the steps, grabbed my camera, and did a little wildlife photography there on the basement steps.

Long, hairy, rusty brown legs were banded with darker stripes. Her oval-shaped abdomen was tan, with a squiggly black chevron pattern and more hair. Long, slender pedipalps (also hairy), stood ready on either side of her mouth to taste, smell, and or help crush her food. Indeed, it was the delicacy of the pedipalps that identified

her as a female – a male would have big club-like pedipalps to aid in reproduction.

A quick search through Larry Weber's Spiders of the Northwoods just got me more confused on the identity of the little critter. Show me some tree buds and I'll point out minute differences that indicate this twig is (obviously) from a beaked hazel and the other one is from an American hazel. Show me a spider, and I say, well, it has long legs and dark stripes. That describes at least a third of the spiders in my guide.

For help, I went straight to the source and emailed the photo to Larry. With enthusiasm, he identified is as "a type of Funnel-web Spider (Funnel-weaver); family Agelenidae. She appears to be the genus Tegenaria." Then—as with any new roommate—I Googled her to find out more.

According to Wikipedia (a good place to start, but not the final word), "house spiders of the genus Tegenaria are fastrunning brownish funnel-web weavers that occupy much of the Northern Hemisphere except for Japan and Indonesia." In northwestern Europe, where giant house spiders (Tegenaria duellica) are native, the British affectionately call them "dust bunny spiders," due to their propensity to set up a territory under furniture.

Long ago, these spiders might also have chosen to set up territories on the ships carrying the first European settlers in the 1600s, and/or in shipments of British lumber during the Napoleonic Wars (early 1800s), thus spreading from Europe to America. Their close association

with humans may have earned them passage elsewhere, too, and they are now suspected to live in almost every country on Earth.

You have to be fast to colonize the world, and giant house spiders held the held the Guinness Book of World Records for top spider speed (1.18 mph) until 1987. The "spiders" that beat their record are not even true spiders! Hmph!

Happily, most of these house spiders would rather try to escape than try to bite you or your pet, so they pose little danger as roommates. David Sedaris, bestselling humorist and author, once befriended a number of Tegenaria spiders and noted that they are "as quiet and unobtrusive as Amish farmers." One thing I did worry about was where this spider was living. Oh, I don't care if it sets up shop in the basement stairwell—that wasn't the problem. But everything I read suggested that these Funnel-web spiders should be living on a flat, sheetlike web with a tubular retreat at one corner. Nowhere at the

bottom of the stairs could I find such a web. So I ventured into the basement itself to see if I could find the spider's

I found the nooks and crannies surprisingly clear of webs, until I reached

true home.

the farthest back corner. There, above the phone and internet boxes, hung a beautiful gossamer sheet web. Tentative jiggling it, I was surprised by a tiny black spider that suddenly bungee—jumped into the abyss and then lowered himself (male spiders are smaller) smoothly on a line of silk. A second black spider still clung to the web. As I looked even closer, I noticed several pale, leggy cellar spiders clinging upside down to messy, irregular webs like something out of Tim Burton's The Nightmare Before Christ-

The crumpled bodies of dead insects littered the floor under this spider colony. I took this as evidence that these spiders were contributing members of the household, not just some lazy freeloaders. Through all this adventure, my dirty clothes sat abandoned on the floor. If only spiders could add "doing laundry" to their list of helpful talents!

KEEPING YOU POSTED by Karol Grasse

To help letter carriers deliver mail daily, the Postal Service is asking customers to clear snow and ice from sidewalks, stairs and mailboxes.

Snow and ice make delivery dangerous and slow. Maintaining a clear path to the mail box – including steps, porches, walkways and street approach – will help letter carriers maintain consistent delivery service and help them get those cards and packages delivered in a timely manner.



Customers receiving door delivery should make sure their sidewalks, steps and porches are clear. Customers receiving curbside delivery should remove snow piles left by snow plows to keep access to their mailboxes clear for letter carriers.

Delivery service may be delayed or curtailed whenever streets or walkways present hazardous conditions for letter carriers or when

snow is plowed against mailboxes. The Postal Service curtails delivery only after careful consideration, and only as a last resort. Any curtailed mail is attempted the next delivery day.

Blue collection boxes also need to be kept clear for our customers to deposit their mail and for the Postal Service to collect the mail for delivery. Residents and businesses with collection boxes near their property are asked to keep them clear of snow and ice. We want our letter carriers to be safe. We can only do this with the help of our customers.

From the PASTOR'S WINDOW



While attending a webinar recently, I was introduced to a new principle that is in our society today. That principle is the "don't ask me to think principle". This comes into play any time we ask a person something that requires them to put effort into thinking beyond simple things. If it isn't simple then forget it. Part of the reason for this, as I understand it, is that people have so much more they are thinking about today, than at any other time in history. Basically we have information overload. Look at how much we have to process on a daily basis. We have so much information coming at us from social media, the internet, TV, you name it. Add to that, the stress that you or I might have if we might miss some important piece of news or information. Years ago at a conference I attended, a keynote speaker told us the sum of human knowledge up to the 1960's doubled from 1960 to 1980. It doubled again by 1990, and by 1995 it had doubled again! No wonder there is information overload. If you were to do an online search, you'd probably discover articles that speak of that doubling anywhere from

I say all this because it is easy to get into not thinking too deeply about anything. Our attention doesn't stay focused for very long. Someone says something and we can just buy into it, especially if that person is viewed as a so-called "expert". Though there is a lot of information out there, it doesn't mean that it is all good or should be given a priority. We need to give more thought about things that pertain to health or future finances more than possibly what this or that celebrity is wearing to a certain event. We should be aware of regurgitated rhetoric, especially when it comes to thinking about spiritual things. For Christians, this means the Word of God, the Bible.

I'm amazed at how few people read and think about the Bible. I have heard folks say how it is just an old book or it is just a bunch of myths, and such. HEALTH & WELLNESS How To Double Breast Cancer Survival Rates

Could it really be possible? Brand new published research suggests a big YES! A large 4 year clinical trial showed a 77 percent reduction in incidence of all combined invasive cancers, including breast cancer when compared to women given a placebo. Another study published in Anticancer Research (March 2014) by Mohr, et al. showed that patients with breast cancer who had higher levels of this mystery molecule in their blood were twice as likely to survive the disease. So why is it such a big mystery? Because we have been shrouding ourselves from it! It's the almighty sunshine-vitamin D to be exact. And of course the most useable form is directly from the sun through your skin. According to Dr. James P. Meschino, DC, MS of Nutritional and Anti-Ageing Research, these clinical analysts looked at data from five large breast cancer studies involving 4,443 breast cancer patients with a follow up period of about nine years. They found that women with an average vitamin D blood level of only 30 ng/ml had survival rates double that of women with average vitamin D blood levels of 17 ng/ ml or less. And to top it off, the average vitamin D blood level in patients who have breast cancer in the United States is 17 ng/ ml. Hmmm, interesting to say

How does this amazing molecule work? Vitamin D is now known to reduce cancer development and progression in 3

main ways. First, adequate levels help to slow down the rate of cell division, in turn reducing the likelihood of these rapidly growing cancer cells. Second, it helps to mature newly formed cells, reducing transformation to a cancerous state. Third, it enhances the immune system to a great extent, so that your body's own 'killer cells' can seek and destroy before any of them start to get out of control.

What should we be doing to get our levels to an optimal range? Well, I may be going out on a limb here but, GET YOUR REAR END IN THE SUN! Of course, listen to your skin and know your limits (burn is bad, slight pinking is good). We seem to be afraid of that gorgeous golden glowing star, which is too bad because it does us so much greatness. Slathering on sun screen is not only horrid for your skin and organs (as it sends millions of toxic chemicals directly into your bloodstream without being filtered by the liver), but it also stops the formation of vitamin D for your body. So yes, the absolute best form of easily assimilated vitamin D comes directly from the sun. The next best thing is a high quality liquid supplement that you apply topically to your skin and take internally under the tongue (a great average dosage is 4000 IUs daily). As a very important side note, if you don't have a good build up of essential fatty acids in your body, you won't be able to utilize the D coming from the sun or a supplement. You'll also be more likely to burn your skin in the sun. So make sure you're getting your fish or plant based omegas, coconut oil, avocados, olive oil, etc at least a couple times daily!

Although it is pretty hard to



overdose on vitamin D, especially in the northern climates, it is still advised to have your levels checked so you know where you are and where you need to be. In my practice, we strive for levels just above 80 ng/ml. It seems to

be the 'zone' to make it all the way through the winter without a single illness as well, which is a welcome plus. So this summer, do your entire body a favor and get some good old fashioned healthy SUNSHINE!
