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



Join Dick Leinenkugel and volunteers from Wilderness Lakes Trails at the Forest Lake Country Store in Land O' Lakes on August 12th and 13th for a weekend of outdoor activity including a brat lunch and beer tasting. All proceeds will benefit the continuing expansion of the Wilderness Lakes Trails bike and pedestrian system. Friday evening from 4:30-7:30pm, the Forest Lake Country Store will host a traditional "Wisconsin Shore Lunch Fish Frv". Bring your family and friends and enjoy a fish fry in the fresh outdoor air of the Northwoods.

Saturday's events will begin with a choice of two bike rides, available

to provide riders an option based on their biking experience. A 12-mile ride beginning at 11:00am., led by Dick Leinenkugel, will be along rustic roads and showcases the 3.2 mile section of the bike trail which was completed in 2012. The second bike ride, a 38 mile ride around the Sylvania Wilderness Area passes through the towns of Watersmeet and Land O' Lakes, uti-

Sylvania Outfitters will offer rides on one and two seat Quadracycles specially made for our Northwoods trails. Quadracycles



are more stable than conventional or 3-wheel bikes and have 21 independent speeds and are a great way to start your cycling adventure.

Amy's Adventure on Wheels

As the journey continues, I am happy to report that my wheels are spinning smoothly and I'm still riding with a smile on my face. Getting through the state of Washington proved to be a challenge with four major passes to get over, the highest being Sherman's pass at an elevation of 5575'. I took the passes one day at a time and other than being utterly exhausted and hungry at the end of each day (easily cured with ice cream, stretching,



and a good night of sleep) things went over very well. Everything is so beautiful that the miles often melt away without my realizing it.

I have now passed through both Washington and Idaho and have thoroughly been enjoying the last few days of relatively flat terrain. There are a more days of flatness

ahead before I enter into Glacier National Park and take on a 6,600' pass and the continental divide. The pass is intimidating, but I'm a bit more conditioned for it now and don't think it will be a problem.

There are so many incredible people that I have had the opportunity to meet along the way, from other cyclists (ages 25-75) to folks who have graciously put me up on their homes and fed me without thinking twice. Just today I pedaled a few miles alongside a retired gentleman who has already cycled over 8,000 miles in an effort to raise money to feed hungry veterans. People's stories and generosity are truly inspiring. I think there is something extra special about cycling that helps to bring

Recently I had the privilege of taking out a couple young fishermen ages of 7 and 12. We were taking part in a local Guides/Kids Day event, myself as a fishing guide volunteering to share my boat, time and knowledge about fishing and the young fishermen as willing learning participants. The day was slightly windy and partly rainy, however, that didn't dampen either the guides' or the youngsters' day on the water. As the old saying goes, a day on the water fishing, just can't be beat.

It is that time of the year when conditions are going dictate your fishing plans, whether it's the weather or the crowds on your favorite fishing lake. Don't stress tough fishing conditions, by following a few tips and a little change in tactics, it will make your outing more successful. If your hot spot is full of recreational boaters, fish earlier or later in the day. Playing the weather game takes a different approach, remember to slow down and down size your presentations in cold front and post frontal conditions. Additionally, you might change your targeted fish by fishing walleyes and muskies early or late in the day

and bass and pan fish midday. Muskie: Weeds, rocks, break lines, and mid lake humps depending on the lake you are fishing and don't forget to bring the arsenal of baits you will be need-



Northern Pike: Fishing near the weeds for pike with spinnerbaits and weedless spoons, such as Johnson Silver Minnows, should get you in a tussle with these water wolves. Jig and minnow combos fishing near weeds for walleyes will catch a few also.

Walleye: You should have a lot of options ready to go to for rigging, jigging, and slip bobbers with a selection of minnows, leeches, and crawlers.

Bass: (Largemouth) Bass spinnerbaits (safety pin style) and crankbaits are working well. If fishing weeds, bring top water baits, adding this approach will add to your success. Texas and Carolina rigging plastics will also entice that fish to bite. (Smallmouth) Basic live bait rig is always a go to presentation along with plastics and crankbaits.

Panfish: For Bluegills, slipbobber rigs, along with live bait such as waxies, small leeches, and red worms. Plastics are working under bobbers also, you just have to twitch your rod to make sure they have actions. Crappies will be looking for cover in the weeds, downed trees or around cribs and a slip bobber rigged with small minnow or plastics- work them the same way as with Bluegills. Perch are in the weeds too, and using a selection of small leeches, red worms and small minnows on slip bobbers are best.

'We want the finest wines available to humanity, and we want them here, and we want them now!' For those who don't know the quote, it's from the movie Withnail & I (1987), a personal favourite of mine, as I love pithy sardonic black comedies. It's a strange movie and to be honest not to most people's tastes, but they proceed to drink through almost the entire repertoire of alcohol possible, including lighter fluid. What I'm trying to say is that drinking is a huge part of US and UK culture. Whether that be bars, pubs, saloons, inns, hostelries, taverns, locals, or drinking holes most people love a chin wag and bevvy, or maybe just have a pint if you don't have any friends.

I do need to clarify a stereotype on British beer or ale. The amount of times I've been told that the British are peculiar because we apparently like our beer warm is astounding! Firstly, I have never drunk a warm beer, unless it has been while sitting with acquaintances in a beer garden in the English countryside and it has taken me a little longer than usual to finish a pint. 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

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

Staying Afloat in this World

¹⁵ I do not ask that you take them out of the world, but that you keep them from the evil one. ¹⁶ They are not of the world, just as I am not of the world. ¹⁷ Sanctify them in the truth; your word is truth: John 17:15-17

Imagine yourself washed adrift in the middle of the Pacific Ocean. You are treading water but just barely. You need something to keep you afloat. And now. When you see a piece of driftwood floating over the crest of the next wave, what do you do? The answer is obvious: swim to it and cling to it for your very life.

What Jesus has to say from about John chapter 13 through his final prayer for the disciples and for us (John 17) composes some of the most incredible teaching ever to be taught. It is more than a life raft in the midst of this world. We could (and maybe should) spend the rest of our lives studying, memorizing and believing what he has to say to his disciples both then and now. The instruction and encouragement in these verses

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contains so much of what it is to be a Christian precisely because they contain so much about who Jesus is, what he came to do and what was going to happen to Him and to His disciples after Him.

Jesus knew he would be sending out his disciples and us after them into a world that hated them because they hated their Master and Savior. (John 15:18-25) He knew that they would face the temptation of trying to escape the hatred of the world. So as Jesus was praying for them, toward the end of his prayer in Chapter 17 he asks His Father for this " I do not ask that you take them out of the world, but that you keep them from the evil one." It is not that Jesus wants them to avoid the world completely (that would be impossible - 1 Cor 5:10) but be kept from the evil one, namely, Satan. Why is it that we are to be left in the world even though Satan and our own hearts seek to draw us away by their temptations?

First: vs 16 "They are not of the world, just as I am not of the world." God has purposes for us in this







world. If God removed us or we remove ourselves from the world, how will others hear the gospel message? How will society hold together if Christians do not at very least slow down the moral decay of our world? How will the world see the grace of God that leads to repentance if we do not show them? We are not of this world. God has changed our hearts, minds and lives. This happens because we trust Jesus Christ and he fashions us into new creations (2 Cor 5:17). We should be no more of or like this world than what Iesus Christ was while he walked this earth.

Second: vs 17 "Sanctify them in the truth; your word is truth" As a new creation our loyalties have changed. The ruling document of this world system is the corrupted and selfish desires of the flesh. (Galatians 5:16-21) The new ruling document for the believer in Jesus Christ is the truth. Not just the fruit of the Spirit (Gal 5:22-23) but the truth. The truth that we are to be sanctified in is wrapped up in one convenient leather (or Smartphone)-bound

book. Your. Word. is. Truth. God leaves us in the world for His purposes to be on his mission for his glory. The joy is, he does not leave us stranded.

He has given us his Son - who lived perfectly in his world and redeemed us from this world. Our only confidence in this world is clinging only and tightly to Him. He has given us the Word the full truth as we attempt to stay afloat in this sea of lies that is our world. It exposes the lies for what they really are. And finally, He has given us His Spirit. The Holy Spirit lives in those who have placed their trust in Jesus Christ. The Holy Spirit exists inside of

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NATURAL CONNECTIONS • Higher Plant by Emily Stone



Naturalist & Educator Emily Stone holds Natural History & Geology Degrees from Northland College and works and writes in Northern WI.

The view was spectacular. Hot and sweaty, we emerged from the humid forest into brilliant sunlight on top of the world. Our toes crept toward the edge of lichen-crusted rocks and our souls soared out over the deep blue waters of Lake Superior.

Hiking to the Top of the Giant, in Sleeping Giant Provincial Park in Ontario, Canada, has been on my adventure list for a while. Despite the July heat, the record month of rainfall collecting in mud puddles, and a bumper crop of bugs, it was worth the wait. Forested hills spread their welcoming embrace, craggy cliffs rose wildly from the blanket of green, and The Lake sparkled with its special magic.

After inhaling the grandeur for several moments I turned my focus downward again, perhaps seeking relief from such strenuous awe.

The world is beautiful at all scales. There at my toes were the exquisite flowers of three-toothed cinquefoil. On each small blossom, five white petals threw themselves back like outspread arms embracing the sky, and a crowd of delicate stamens and pistils reached eagerly toward the sun. Shiny green leaves spread out in a low mat. Each leaf was palmately divided into three lobes, and each lobe was tipped by three pointed teeth.

These are the mountain men of the plant world. Three-toothed

cinquefoil can't survive on good soils where numerous neighbors crowd close. Instead, they claim space where others can't survive and dig their toes into craggy bedrock. Here they eke out a living on dust, rain, beauty, and solitude. Woody, creeping stems cling to the available footholds; thick, leathery leaves defend their precious water; and red pigments protect their winter foliage from harsh sun.

They've come a long way.

Just over 1.1 billion years ago, two separate events initiated this combination of rock and flower. These craggy cliffs where cinquefoil clings solidified from magma 1.1 billion years ago during the mid-continent rift event that initiated the Lake Superior basin. The continent tried to rip itself in two. Farther south, along the North Shore of Minnesota, lava erupted onto the surface. Up here in Canada, molten rock squeezed in between layers of older sedimentary rocks. The magma cooled, the rocks tilted a bit, and then the softer sedimentary rocks began to erode away. This resulted in the spectacular topography and my steep hike.

The other event happened in an ancient sea where the first cells of

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One eukaryotic cell, now known as an archaeplastida, engulfed a free-living, photosynthetic cyanobacteria. The two single-celled organisms began living in symbiosis. Some scientists say that the eukaryote enslaved the cyanobacteria, forcing it to produce food for them both. Others acknowledge that the surrounding cell would have given the cyanobacteria a measure of protection, plus access to the sunlight, water, and carbon dioxide it needed to photosynthesize.

Eventually the two different cells began to coordinate their division (and hence their reproduction), and even trade genes. Eventually the cyanobacteria was no longer a free-living endosymbiont—it was a chloroplast-just one of the organelles in the eukaryotic cell.

Fast forward to half a billion years ago, and those plant cells containing chloroplasts developed into multicellular organisms and moved out of the sea. But the first simple land plants still needed easy access to plentiful water for both reproduction and photosynthesis.

Now, today, I can admire a beautiful flower with a woody stem clinging to a dry cliff more than a thousand feet above the

down was the right way to seek relief from strenuous awe.

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
