

#### Still waiting...

The cooler air temps have started changing water temps just a little slower than anticipated. I still have water in the high 60's and low 70's which hasn't changed a lot of tactics yet, but be ready when it changes, it could quickly. We all know that any day fishing is a good day but when you're catching fish it is a great day! *Muskie:* I would keep on throwing the larger size baits such as double 9's and 10's spinnerbaits, bigger jerk baits and even top water on warmer days yet. Remember that the proper

equipment is needed to use certain baits to make your fishing experience enjoyable. *Northern Pike:* Fishing the weed edges with bass style spinnerbaits or inline spinnerbaits such as Mepps #4 and #5 and weedless spoons, like Johnson Silver Minnows, should get you in a tussle with these water wolves. Jig and minnow combos near weeds for walleyes will catch a few also. *Walleye:* Look for the deep weed edges that are by sharp breaks for the best results. If the wind picks up, don't hesitate to go to a heavier jig to maintain bottom contact. Minnows are starting to become more the bait of choice along with crawlers, leeches are getting harder to find.

Bass: (Largemouth)Bass spinnerbaits (safety pin style) and crankbaits are working well. If fish-



ing weeds, don't forget to bring top water baits like a Scum Frog or a Zara Spook; adding this approach will add to your success. Texas and Carolina rigging



plastics will also entice that fish to bite. (Smallmouth) Basic live

bait rig is always a go to presentation; also plastics and crankbaits will work well.

*Panfish:* For Bluegills slip bobber rigs are the way to go baited up with a good selection of live bait such as waxies, small leeches and red worms. Plastics are working under bobbers also; you just have to twitch your rod to make sure they have movement action. Crappies will be looking for cover in the weeds, downed trees or around cribs and a slip bobber rigged with small minnow or plastics; work them the same way as with Bluegills. Perch are in the weeds too, and using a selection of small leeches, (if you can still find them) red worms and small minnows on slip bobbers are the ticket for them.

#### Praying for the Best Things

<sup>"9</sup>And so, from the day we heard, we have not ceased to pray for you, asking that you may be filled with the knowledge of his will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding, <sup>10</sup>so as to walk in a manner worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him, bearing fruit in every good work and increasing in the knowledge of God." Colossians 1:9-10

What if you could only make one request of God? What has been the most recurring or most desperate plea from your heart lately? What is the thing that you want God to do the most? The reality is, what we pray for reveals our heart. What we most desire for God to do reveals what we think is most important. Some of us may struggle to pray at all. That too reveals our heart. Not praying reveals that we think we have it handled on our own, that God doesn't care or that he can't or won't help us. None of those things are true and yet that is what we believe when we do not pray or avoid praying for certain things.

If and when we do pray, what we pray for also reveals what we believe about God. If we pray most often or only about health and safety (things we certainly can and should pray for) what are we saying about God? When we primarily or only pray for those things, we reveal that we believe that those are not only the most important things to pray for, but they are the most important things to God. The question is not whether we should pray for those

things. The question is are those the most important things? Is it true that God is concerned about our or others' health and safety? Yes, definitely – He knows the very number of hairs on our head (and whether they fall out). But is it true that God is primarily concerned for our physical health and safety? No. How do we know that? God's Word says other things are more important.

Paul here, and the other believers in the Bible, show us what they believe is most important and true about God by what they most often pray about. Just like you and I, when Paul prays for others he reveals what he believes is most important in this life. What does he pray? What does he believe is most important in God's economy?


That believers be Filled with the knowledge of his (God's) will. What is important for us is that we know God and know his will for our lives. Where do we find God's will for our lives? God has written it down for us in his Word. Not so much God's will of what color socks I will wear today, but God's will as to the kind of life and how I go about this life with those socks on. To be filled (not a quarter tank) with knowing what God desires for me as found in his Word.Estimates

In all spiritual wisdom and understanding, This is taking the next step with the portion of God's will and word that we understand. This is the ability to discern the truth and distinguish between true and false and wisdom. Making good (obedient) decisions based on the truth. This means to take time to trace out the practical implications of the knowledge we have. We may have understanding of the truth, but does it actually integrate with the nitty gritty, practical decisions of our

lives. This is different than common sense - graciously given (in differing amounts) to all people. This is "spiritual" wisdom and understanding. As in given by the Holy Spirit to those who believe in Christ. We often seek to "be spiritual" when we should instead be seeking to be "led by the spirit." That is, led by the Spirit of God who guides us through and in accordance with (never contrary to) the Word of God.

Verse 10 continues, So as to walk in a manner worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him. So this wisdom and understanding ought to produce some practical outcomes. Namely that all that we do be worthy of our holy God and fully please his heart. Every day, every decision, every moment of our lives is lived either in accord with or against God's heart. We must know what he desires of us if we are to ever to please Him. How do we know if we are pleasing Him? We are Bearing Fruit. Our relationship with God and our abiding in Jesus (John 17) ought to produce in us evidences that we know God and are connected to Jesus through his death and resurrection for our sins. We are to bear fruit in every good work. Paul finishes his prayer asking that they would Increase in the Knowledge of God. God's desire is that we become more mature by means of knowing God better. As we know God better we can obey him better. As we obey, we grow. Remember, what is most important to God IS most important. God help us to see the difference. In Christ, My Only Hope.

# NATURAL CONNECTIONS • Aging Eagles by Emily Stone

The mist abated, but dense clouds still hung low over the lake, their wispy undersides tickling the dark tips of trees. As we drew near the narrow, piney peninsula at the north end of Lake Owen, a bit of white emerged from the gloom. Through my camera's zoom, I spied on a scruffy-looking adult bald eagle, its feathers matted

from the damp weather. Although the supra-orbital ridges above eagles' eyes often make

them look fierce, today the expression seemed to lean more toward grumpiness. That's just projecting our emotions from the gray day, though, since the ridge of bone is an adaptation that protects their eyes from injury, glare, and perhaps even rain, but doesn't truly convey mood.

This adult eagle had more reason to be tired and grumpy than we did, though, since its very large chick was begging for food just around the corner. Our raingearclad Loon Pontoon Tour puttered toward the loud chirping, as we scanned the

> large clump of sticks high in a red pine tree for any signs of movement. During the past few I've weeks spotted moving feathers in the nest. Not a great view, but still a fun sighting.

> The nest quiet, was though. Where was the chick? There! Midway up a dead, lichencovered pine, about 40 feet from the nest,

The hulking, brown figure could hardly be called a chick, though. It was a recently fledged juvenile who had grown its first set of real feathers and left the nest. Most resources agree that bald eagles typically fledge around 10 weeks of age. Counting back, that puts its hatch day in early June.

Though full-size, this young eagle looked quite different than its majestic parent with the snow-white head and tail. Shades of brown covered its head and body, but the damp day had matted some of the feathers and revealed a mottling of white where the basal portions of contour feathers showed through. Its eyes and beak were dark, too, in contrast to the yellow facial features of an adult. Dark wing and tail feathers drooped low.


Like gangly teenagers, juvenile eagles look bigger than their parents. In some cases, a well-fed youngster actually may weigh more than their harried caregivers, but that doesn't seem to be common. Instead, their larger appearance is due to longer flight feathers, which help them compensate for a lack of flying skills. Their next set of feathers will decrease in size as a nod to increased agility. Those new flight feathers come in gradually, though, and during the eagle's second summer its wings and tail sport both longer and shorter feathers.

It may seem odd that our Loon Pontoon Tour spent so much time watching an eagle, but as with everything in nature, the lives of these two species are quite connected. For one, eagles are the main predator of adult loons, and

also attack loon chicks. Loons even have an eagle-specific alarm call to warn their chicks of danger. The animosity between the two species may be due to their shared habitat and competition for fish.

They probably don't realize it, but these adversaries share many common enemies as well. Water pollution, habitat loss, harassment by humans, and lead poisoning are just a few.

Loons and eagles also share quite a few elements of their life histories. Both black/brown-and-



white birds eat mainly fish, are formidable predators, raise just a few young and care for them diligently, take several years to reach maturity, and look distinctive while immature.

Last week, on a different lake, we spotted three juvenile loons in their first true plumage. Just like this young eagle, they were mottled brown and white with dark eyes. Those loons will migrate to the Gulf of Mexico this fall, and stay there for three to four years. Once mature, they'll molt into their snazzy adult feathers and fly north. If they're lucky, they may start breeding immediately, but most loons don't earn a territory until age six.

Eagles have a similar youth, with two main exceptions: they wander widely during their immature stage instead of staying south, and their plumage changes a little bit each year until they become adults.

Not far down the lake, we spotted a great example of this. An immature bald eagle, hatched in a previous spring, perched atop a white pine tree. In contrast to its younger cousin, this eagle had quite a few pale feathers on its head and neck, with a dark eye stripe reminiscent of an osprey. In addition, its beak was a lighter shade of gray, and had more yellow at the corners. Its eye color was lighter, too. All these characteristics identify this bird as a 2.5 year-old, who would have been born in spring 2014.

By their fourth summer, as 3.5 year-olds, eagles have nearadult plumage, with pale heads and tales that still show some gray and brown flecking. Over the next two molts their white areas just get more pure.

Despite the drizzle, fog, and low clouds (or perhaps because of them) both loons and eagles were cooperative for our tour of the lake. What a treat to observe these two majestic birds and learn a little more about their lives!

## **ISCCW Invasive Species Awareness**

The Invasive Species Control Coalition of Watersmeet (ISCCW), aka Watersmeet Lakeguards, is a 501(c) (3), not-for-profit organization established in 2006 to protect the environment of Watersmeet Township from aquatic invasive species. The ISCCW accomplishes this extremely important task through Education, Lake Monitoring, and chemical treatment as well as hand removal. Fifteen directors, all volunteers, who are residents and business owners in the township, lead the ISCCW through the many challenges involving prevention, treatment, and control of all potential invasive species threatening area lakes.

Educating the public regarding prevention of potential invasive species in area lakes is one of the most important tasks of the ISCCW. Our educator, Denise Fauntleroy, hired by the ISCCW, spends most of her time visiting area lake associations, libraries, and other interested groups to inform and energize people to become part of the solution in combating the spread of all invasive plants and organisms in all lakes and water bodies in the region. Our most recent outreach project has involved building a marketing billboard, similar to one seen in St Germain, to help spread the word regarding awareness of protecting area lakes by all water sports enthusiasts. This new advertising tool can be seen at the BP station in Land O' Lakes and will be used to support education efforts throughout Watersmeet Township.

Anglers, recreational boaters, duck hunters, and kayakers all have a responsibility to prevent the spread of Invasive species. Most boat owners and those recreating on lakes know and understand the importance of preventing the

transfer of invasive species from one lake to another. Individuals can prevent the spread of invasive species by following a few simple steps: 1-Inspect and clean boats, trailers, and equipment. Remove all mud, debris, and aquatic plant material from trailers and watercraft before launching or after retrieving a watercraft. 2-Drain live wells, bilges and all water from boats before leaving the access site. Disinfect live wells and bilges with a bleach solution (1/2 cup bleach to 5 gallons of water) when possible. 3-Dry boats and equipment. 4-Dispose of unused bait in the trash. Do not release bait into the water. 5-Do not transfer fish to water bodies other than where they were caught.

Eurasian water-milfoil is the most well known invasive specie and is relatively easy to detect



and control on boats and trailers. This plant is native to Europe and Asia and was first noticed in the Watersmeet Township in 2000. It is fast growing and creates an extensive canopy formation, obstructing recreation and navigation. Left on its own to grow, Eurasian Water-Milfoil can take over an entire lake, severely damaging the ecosystems in/around the lake. Early detection, treatment, and prevention are extremely important to minimize the effects this plant has on all water bodies. However, our area lakes also contain other Invasive Species that are just as damaging, but receive less attention than Eurasian water-milfoil:

Curley Leaf Pondweed causes weed mats that shade out native plants and when they die, they re-



leases nutrients which cause algal bloom and other problems.

Zebra Mussels are filter feeders which take plankton out of the water that young fish rely on for food. They are extremely dangerous to the eco-system. Zebra Mus-



sels can reproduce quickly and are almost impossible to eradicate once they are introduced into a lake, river, or stream. They will greatly improve water clarity allowing other invasive plants to grow in deeper depths. (See:page 10 "We're On the Lookout!")

Rusty Crayfish graze on and can eliminate native aquatic plant beds. Their claws are larger and



smoother than other crayfish. They displace and are capable of hybridizing with native crayfish. Spiny Waterflea competes with

small fish for food and fouls gear. They are very tiny, less than <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> inch in length, and form clumps on lines and cable. The clumps



look and feel like gelatin and are impossible to eradicate.

Purple Loosestrife is a hardy perennial, which can degrade wetlands and diminish their value for wildlife habitat. Three 7' spike with small purple flowers, downy smooth-edged leaves,

usually paired opposite.



Most of these invasive species are already present in Watersmeet Township. Lake monitoring and treatment is crucial in the fight against all invasive plants and organisms. Through the use of lake surveys, boat inspections, and boat washing operations (ISCCW has 3 portable pressure washers), and recruitment and training of volunteers, ISCCW continues to take aggressive action to detect and deter all invasive species before becoming a major problem on area lakes.

This work is done through grants, voluntary membership in the ISCCW, individual, Township, and Tribal donations, along with in-kind donations from many businesses and private citizens in the area. Partnerships with the US Forest Service, MI DNR, and National Fish-Wildlife Foundation are also critical in obtaining the resources needed to accomplish ISCCW goals.

## We're On the Lookout!

On Saturday, August 13th ISCCW Boat Washer, Ted Boksa, was manning the recently relocated 3rd portable power washer at Bent's Camp Landing which provides access to 12 Michigan Lakes and 3 Border lakes. He was wrapping up his shift when a truck pulled in with a pontoon boat. He approached the driver with his usual greetings and standard questions:

-What state are you from?

-When was your boat last in the water?

-What body of water was the boat last on?

-Do have knowlyou edge about Aquatic Invasive Species(AIS)?

-Are you checking your craft for AIS?

-And last, May we inspect and Power Wash your boat?

When he inspected the pontoons he found them heavily covered with Zebra Mussels. Zebra Mussels are a non-native aggressive mussel that looks like a small clam with a yellowish or brownish D-shaped shell, usually with alternating dark and light colored stripes. They can be up to two inches long, but most are under an inch. Mussels draw water into their bodies and filter out suspended microscopic plants for food. This process increases water clarity thus allows higher light penetration which fosters deeper growth of aquatic plants. The creation of this changed habitat promotes larger populations of smaller fish species and inhibits larger species from finding food sources. The boat had been pulled out of the Wisconsin River south of Rothschild earlier that day and the owner was preparing to launch into The Cisco Chain. He

tion and was thankful for the assistance he received from ISCCW to get his boat into compliance. The washing took over 45 minutes to complete before the boat was launched onto the water.

Even boaters who think they understand the importance of AIS control and who take precaution, can still miss the presence of AIS. It's up to each of us to keep our lakes clean. Make sure to stay informed about AIS by checking our website(ISCCW.org), reading current materials available on AIS, and educating guests who visit the area about the importance of keeping these ever threatening Invasives OUT.

## **KEEPING YOU POSTED** •

School's back in session. That means more children will be walking and riding to and from school. It also means an increase in young pedestrians potentially darting across roadways or wandering in front of alleys and driveways. The Postal Service is asking moms, dads and school officials to remind children about taking extra precautions to avoid potential accidents around mailboxes and postal vehicles. Our postal employees plan on being extra careful when driving at or near schools or playgrounds says. But we need the support of every member from the local community to help keep our children safe. There are several precautions students can take to avoid accidents. First, never approach a postal vehicle when a letter carrier is delivering the mail. Additionally, children should refrain from playing electronic games while walking outside, so they can be aware of the surroundings and avoid any potential accidents.
