November on the Great Lakes have been known to be brutal and caused many shipwrecks in the past. The Edmund Fitzgerald on Lake Superior and the Phoenix on Lake Michigan, are just two of the hundreds, ending their journeys in the cold waters of these huge fresh water lakes. November 10th marks the anniversary of the sinking of the Edmund Fitzgerald. Forty-two years ago on November 9th, 1975, the bulk freighter, left port from Superior, WI with a

cargo of taconite pellets headed for Detroit, MI. along with an-

other vessel called the Arthur M. Anderson. A day later on November 10th, while battling the waves of a bad winter storm on Lake Superior, the Edmund Fitzgerald received massive damage, causing the vessel to lose radar and eventually sank, taking all 29 crew members on board down with her. The ship lies at the bottom in two sections, 530 feet deep, 17 miles from the entrance to Whitefish Bay.

Although, the November waters on Lake Michigan were calm, the Phoenix's last journey encountered a disaster of its own, which takes me to the next shipwreck. Walking along the beach in Sheboygan, WI., it's not likely you would be thinking about history until spotting a object that would

make your mind wonder as to its origin. Intrigued by shipwrecks to begin with, when this shoe pictured here, was given

to me by a family member who found it, I started endlessly researching trying to find some answers of its history. The seeminly most logical answer was arrived after reading about the sinking of the Phoenix on November 21st, 1847. The wooden steamship was carrying mostly Dutch im-Joseph Surface captures the Edmund Fitzgerald in one of his oil paint-

migrant families with a lot of children aboard. After making a stop in Mani- towoc and continuing its journey heading south down the shore of Lake Michigan, the Phoenix was overtaken by flames due to its pumps not working properly and sank just off the shores of Sheboygan. Anywhere from 190-250 lives were lost, it is known as the fourth worst tragedy in the history of the Great Lakes. We will never really know the true history of this shoe, who it belonged to, if they were one of the survivors, if they were even on the Phoenix, but how remarkable it shows up on the beach approximately 160 years later.

## Sugars Can Be Hidden Calories

For many people, added sugars are a hidden source of extra calories that can make it hard to stay at a healthy body weight. "On average, one of every six calories we eat comes from added sugars," says Jenette Gunville, UW-Extension Family Living Agent for Florence, Forest, and Vilas Counties.

According to Gunville, cutting back on added sugars is a good way to improve the nutritional quality of your diet. She recommends the following steps to limit added sugars in your diet:

- Drink water, low-fat/skim milk, 100 percent fruit juice, coffee, or tea instead of drinks with added sugar.
- Cut back on desserts, baked treats, and candies.
- $\bullet \, Snack \, on \, fruits \, and \, vegetables, \, whole \, grains \, breads \, and \, crackers, \,$ yogurt, low-fat cheese, and nuts.
- When you bake, look for recipes that use less sugar.
- Check the ingredient labels on processed foods and avoid those with lots of added sugars.

Gunville says that "added" sugars are sugars and syrups that are put in when foods or beverages are processed or prepared. Over a third of added sugars in the diets of most Americans come from soda and other sweetened beverages. She points out that energy drinks, sports drinks and fancy coffee beverages are in this category. "Don't be fooled by nutritioussounding names such as 'herbal boost' or 'athletes' pep," warns Gunville.



According to Gunville, the best way to know which foods and beverages are high in added sugars is to check the ingredient list. A product is high in added sugar if one of the first two or three ingredients listed have is high fructose corn syrup, white sugar, brown sugar, corn syrup, corn syrup solids, raw sugar, malt syrup, maple syrup, pancake syrup, molasses, honey, fructose, and dextrose.



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## **KEEPING YOU POSTED**•

The US Postal Service has announced the 2016 holiday mailing and shipping deadlines for domestic and international destinations as customers begin to prepare for the busy shopping and shipping season. To ensure timely delivery of cards, letters, and packages during the holidays within the United States by December 25th, the Postal Service recommends that customers ship their items by the following dates: *Mail-by Dates-Domestic Services* 

- Dec. 15th USPS Retail Ground: Ground service for less-thanurgent deliveries and oversized packages.
- Dec. 20th First-Class Mail: Service for standard-sized, single-piece envelopes and small packages weighing up to 13 ounces with delivery in 3 business days or less.
- Dec. 21st Priority Mail: Domestic service in 1, 2 or 3 business days based on where the package is mailed and where it's being sent, variety of flat-rate options.
- Dec. 23rd Priority Mail Express: Fastest domestic service, guaranteed overnight scheduled delivery to most locations. Some restrictions and exceptions apply. Please note, Priority Mail Express postage refund eligibility is adjusted for shipments mailed between December 22nd-25th. Complete details on Mailing and Shipping services can be found on usps.com.

Internationally - Customers mailing internationally during the holidays are advised to visit the International Shipping page on usps. com for more information. When mailing and shipping internationally, customers must also follow necessary customs guidelines. Mail-by Dates (Military) - The Postal Service is committed to ensuring those serving in the nation's armed forces and diplomatic service receive their presents, care packages, and cards in time for the holidays. Complete military mailing deadlines to APO/FPO/DPO (Air/Army Post Office, Fleet Post Office and Diplomatic Post Office) destinations worldwide, as well as tips and guidelines, can be found at: http://about.usps.com/news/national-releases/2016/pr16\_080.htm.

Shipping Supplies - As an added convenience, the Postal Service offers a wide variety of shipping supplies in multiple sizes at local Post Offices and online at usps.com. Some supplies, such as Priority Mail products, can also be delivered to the sender free of charge by going to usps.com/freeboxes.

Customers may also ship using their own materials. As a reminder, all packages weighing more than 13 ounces and bearing only stamps as postage cannot be deposited in collection boxes or given to letter carriers. These packages must be presented to a Postal Service employee at a retail window counter.


## Christmas Walk in Boulder Junction

## ENGLISHMAN IN AMERICA • by Albemarle Ravenswood

What is this festivity you speak of?

We now enter a period of time where British people haven't a clue what their American friends are on about or why they are celebrating. Although the vernacular of Thanksgiving is beginning to become more widespread within the UK, it certainly isn't at all widely celebrated, especially outside of cosmopolitan London. My first taste of a traditional Thanksgiving was when I was invited to a friend's house in Sacramento. Where I was plied with enough turkey to sink the Mayflower itself. Resulting in me then slipping into a food coma and watching the 49ers beat somebody, a feat, which is hard to believe in current circumstances.

However, the UK does have its own celebrations to speak of in November. Guy Fawkes night, which takes place on 5th November every year. This annual event commemorates what could have happened. It's the time of year where it is obligatory for you to watch V for Vendetta, and for those who haven't seen it, try and perfect the 'V speech' by V who is played by Hugo Weaving. The fall out from this film however, is that all any wannabe anarchists now have to do is don a Guy Fawkes mask, made both famous and infamous by this film, whereby they suddenly think they are a miraculous creation of both Kropotkin and Che Guevara. Anyhow, the commemoration itself is of the foiling of the gunpowder plot on 5th November 1605, when there was an attempt to blow up the Houses of Parliament (London) and kill the King, James I. The ringleader, Guy Fawkes, was luckily found and arrested and bonfires were lit in celebration. ## Line Dance Teacher Wins Award



## NATURAL CONNECTIONS • The Pipes of Pan by Emily Stone

A small campfire, composed mostly of jack pine twigs laden with tightly closed cones, crackled softly against the descending dusk as I pulled a book out of my portage pack. For this trip, I'd chosen Open Horizons, Sigurd Olson's autobiography, which is filled with just as many lyrical scenes and philosophical meanderings as his other books.

I read the first lines aloud. "The Pipes of Pan sound early before the sense of wonder is dulled, while the world is wet with dew and still fresh as the morning." And before I could begin the next sentence, a sweet, tooting call floated across the bay. The first

time I heard the regular, almost mechanical, song of a saw-whet owl, I thought it was a car alarm or back-up beep. I learned my lesson quickly, though, and now perk up my ears on the rare occasion of this simple serenade.

Saw-whets are tiny owls, only as big as a robin, who are nonetheless tough as nails. They breed in the boreal forests of southern Canada, and the conifer forests of the northern and western United States. They are variably migratory, with some owls overwintering in their breeding territories, and others, especially from the far north, heading south. Their peak migration tends to coincide with leaf-off. This guy was right on time.

The owl ceased tooting after less than a minute, but before I could return to Sigurd, another sound cut through the dusk. This time it was the messy pattering of ducks taking off, and then the

breathy whistling of wind through wings as a small flock of goldenrelocated eves out of our bay. Their distinctive flight sound has earned these compact, blackand-white ducks nickname the "whistlers."

These interruptions to Sigurd's musings on the Pipes of Pan seemed appropriate, since Pan and his pipes

represent the harmonies of nature itself. In mythology, Pan is the half-goat Greek god of the earth who makes music with a set of reeds. "What I heard there were the Pipes," wrote Olson, "and what I sensed, I know now, was the result of a million years of listening and being aware..."

This late fall trip was one of the quietest I've experienced in the Boundary Waters. Few other hardy souls braved the cold snap. Many birds had either migrated or fallen silent. The sounds we did hear, though, seemed more significant in their isolation.

At about 10:30 p.m., the quiet gave way to the patter of rain on nylon. Just before dawn, the sound changed distinctly to the harsh chatter of sleet, and

then the soft swish of snow. Snow! The precipitation continued off-and-on all day. Happily, we were traveling with the wind, so the sleet simply hissed against our rain jacket hoods instead of stinging at our red cheeks. Neoprene gloves helped, but did not completely warm our hands. Portage landings were awkward, given the strong incentive to keep our feet dry. This is what outdoor adventurers often call "Type 2 Fun," defined by The Mountain Training School as "not particularly enjoyable at the time, but rewarding after the fact."

A crisp day dawned with every leaf edged in lacy frost.

Although, there was something about the challenge—and certainly the swing of a paddle and the balance of a canoe—that


was pleasurable in the moment, even against the cold. Sigurd Olson experienced pleasure in the face of discomfort, too, writing: "but for a moment the Pipes had sounded above the crashing of the waves..."

The weather did improve a little by our final day, and we enjoyed a calm, sunny afternoon listening to the clear whistles of a couple of gray jays, the chirping of an eagle, and the low, wild roar of a rapids in the narrows. That peaceful afternoon faded into one of the quietest nights I've ever spent in a tent, followed by a crisp dawn with every leaf edged in lacy frost.

The lake steamed silently as we made breakfast, and a flock of geese chattered amicably in the distance-their conversation slowly drifting southward. Not in a hurry to end our trip, we sat idly watching the mists swirl, our empty oatmeal bowls forgotten. In the absolute calm, I began to notice an occasional soft rustling sound. All around our campsite, birch leaves were detaching one-by-one and drifting to the ground. Not a whisper of breeze disturbed them, but perhaps the weight of the white rim of frost was enough to break them free.



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## OUTSIDE • Fishing Report by Colin Crawford

Is fall finally here?

We are now getting water temps in the mid 40's and it should change your bait selection to suckers for muskie and red tail chubs for walleyes.

Muskie: Suckers are turning into the bait of choice for fish and anglers alike. Someone should also be throwing a jerkbait or a big crankbait in addition to the sucker. Northern Pike: Fishing weed edges and or some type of cover with jerkbaits have been boating some nice fish this week.

Walleye: This week we found them on deep mud flats and still on the deep rock humps and early and late in the day you can find fish on the tops and during the day they will go deeper you will have to follow them out. Jig and large minnow combos and lindy rigging with large red tail chubs seem to work the best.

Bass: (Largemouth) Bass are moving out of the shallows and lurking in the deep weed edges because they are starting to die. If fishing weeds, (Smallmouth) basic live bait rig is always a go to presentation; also crankbaits will work well.

Panfish: Bluegills are being

found on the deepest weed edges where the greenest weeds are, slip bobber rigs are the way to go baited up with a good selection of live bait such as waxies, and red worms. Plastics are working under bobbers also; you just have to twitch your rod to make sure they have movement action. Crappies are starting to suspend over

some mud flats, small jigs tipped

with minnows or small blade baits

like cicadas will work. Perch are



being caught on the mud flats also using small minnows.




#### Transformed by a Transfer

<sup>13</sup>He has delivered us from the domain of darkness and transferred us to the kingdom of his beloved Son, 14 in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins. Colossians 1:13-14

Transfers change things. On the small scale we find ourselves, maybe more often than we like, transferring money from the savings account to the debit or credit card account to cover the amount. The transfer that we make there changes things. Doing so avoids a penalty, covers our credit, and accomplishes something in our lives and the way we are able to live. The bigger the transfer, the bigger the change moving forward. Any transfer has effects, it changes things.

Think for a moment of an even bigger transfer. Suppose you were called into the office at work and you were told you were going to be transferred. At that point you would want to know the location and the scope of your transfer. If







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you were merely being shifted to a new title but doing a similar job from the same place, the transfer may not mean that big of a change. However, if you were told that you were being transferred to the company's home office in Tokyo or Dubai and your responsibilities would be radically altered from your current ones, that would be a much bigger change.

A transfer of that size would not only affect you, but also your family, friends, acquaintances and coworkers. The bigger the scope and location of the transfer, the bigger the change in the effects of that transfer. The more radical the transfer the more impossible it is for things to stay the same. If tomorrow you were told you were relocating to Dubai, nothing in your life would be untouched by the change. I would like to submit to you this related idea: If you have been transferred by God from "the kingdom of darkness... into the kingdom of His beloved Son" nothing in your life will remain the same.

Sadly though, many who claim to be believers in Jesus Christ continue to live as if that transfer didn't change anything. But if we think about it, how much bigger transfer could there be? This is a cosmic, God-wrought, eternal, earth shattering rescue operation. It says that we were delivered from the "domain of darkness." This is bigger than a job transfer to Dubai. Before being rescued by God in Christ, we live in a domain

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characterized by the dark forces of chaos, Satan, evil and sin, with our own corrupted rebellious hearts and the world's desires having the ruling authority and sway.

God's Word declares that through trust in Christ's work on the cross for us, he delivers us, rescues us, saves us out of that domain and instead transfers us to the domain or the kingdom of Jesus Christ, his beloved son. We needed rescued from the life and world we lived in. He rescues us by transferring us out of a dark rebel kingdom into the kingdom (of light), where the Son is. What has happened to the people in this kingdom? They have redemption and forgiveness. To be redeemed comes from the transaction (transfer) that happened in the slave market. We were slaves to sin, we could not free ourselves. Yet God paid the price to redeem us and free us through the infinitely valuable life of his son. We are set free, but we are also, as the verse says. forgiven. Tied closely to redemption is the reality of forgiveness. More than human forgiveness where we withhold our small desires for revenge and recompense, God's forgiveness of a sinner saved by grace is an incredible feat only accomplished by the cross.

If then we have been transferred on this cosmic level from the domain and rulership we used to be in, what kind of change ought to happen in us? We may forget about a bank transfer or even adjust pretty well to the new normal of a job transfer, but this? God delivering us from the domain of death, darkness, sin and penalty and placing us in the kingdom of light, forgiveness, grace and mercy where his son, who died for us, reigns, rules and reconciles us with God Himself? What in our lives shouldn't change just in light of our sheer gratefulness for his grace? This transfer changes things. In Christ, My Only Hope.



In fiscal 2016, the Department funded 57 JEM projects, awarding a total of more than \$1.1 million. Visitor expenditures driven by the marketing from these projects will exceed \$31 million. JEM grant funds are available to non-profit organizations for the promotion of Wisconsin tourism events and destinations. The state can fund up to 75 percent of a project's first-year advertising and marketing costs, and provide support for second- and third-year projects with decreasing amounts for funding until projects become self-sustaining.
