His past achievements include being a 12-time Stock Class World Champion at the World Championship Snowmobile Derby in Eagle River, along with being a 3-time United States Snowmobile Association (USSA) Driver of the Year. He also has many USSA class championships under his belt as well as being a guest racer at the Jackson Hole World Championship Snowmobile Hill Climb in Jackson, WY.

Since retiring from oval track racing in 2003, Chad keeps up with his passion for snowmobiling by filming extreme "Born to Ride" videos with Dobson Entertainment and by boon-

docking. Boondocking is an extreme type of riding that involves getting off the beaten path, which Chad and friends do weekly in the U.P. of Michigan in addition to an annual trip out west.

Before snowmobile racing Chad was an off road racer. Utilizing his many years of racing experience, he presently works with his father at Ramesh Motorsports

in Land O' Lakes. Chad and his wife Shelly are the proud parents of 3 children who are very involved in hockey (not racing), and are the owners Northscape Landscaping and Garden Center which keep them busy in the summer months.





How Good is Good?

It's the New Year! Usually at this time of year people take time to assess their lives and give thought to making changes for the year to come. Besides getting rid of unwanted habits, people usually make resolutions to try and live better lives. Have you ever thought about it though? Our standards of better are compared to how we have been living and not what may be better. For instance, a person may decide to drop from eating 6 donuts a day to 4 donuts a day. Better, yet is it good enough? Have we ever really thought about how good is good?

In Mark's gospel account, in the tenth chapter, Jesus meets a rich young man. He approaches Jesus addressing Him as Good Teacher. Jesus asks him, "Why do you call Me good? No one is good but One, that is, God. You know the commandments: 'Do not commit adultery,' 'Do not murder,' 'Do not steal,' 'Do not bear false witness,' 'Do not defraud,' 'Honor your father and your mother.' " Mark 10:18-19 I doubt the young man recognized that Jesus was really

God in the flesh. How we need to grasp the truth of what Jesus goes on to say, no one is good but God. He finishes by telling the young man to keep the commandments. Interestingly, the young man doesn't see that Jesus only shares the last six of the Ten Commandments. The man responds by telling the Lord that he has kept all these from his youth. He didn't notice that the commands pertaining to God were omitted. In his eyes, he no doubt thought he was okay. Just in case, he asks Jesus if there was anything else. To this, Christ lovingly replies, "One thing you lack: Go your way, sell whatever you have and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, take up the cross, and follow Me." Mark 10:21. He had kept most of the commandments, but not all of them. He had an idol, his wealth.

What is good for each of us to consider is how we can be like this rich young man. We can become very selective in the commandments we keep and fail to realize those we break. Years later, the Apostle Paul would

cite the words of the Psalmist, "There is none righteous, no, not one." Romans 3:10. Each of us needs to realize that no matter how good we think we are, we are not good enough. We all fall short of heaven. The Good News is that God made a way apart from keeping the commandments to get right with Him. That way is through faith in Jesus Christ and the work of Calvary's cross. On the cross, God poured out the full fury of His wrath against our sin on Jesus. Jesus took our punishment.

We must acknowledge we are sinners and can't do anything to appease God's wrath on our own, meaning that our goodness isn't good enough. We must believe that Christ took our punishment at the cross and successfully defeated our sin, confessing Him as Lord in our lives and with our mouths. If you never have called upon the Lord to be saved, why not make the New Year the time to do so. If you have, commit yourself anew to living for Him each day throughout the New Year. Know I'm praying for you.

As in yesteryear, each member of the band performed his own

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
improvised melodic solo sometime during the evening, each keeping time with the snapping fingers of Tole who played the "role" of Jimmy Dorsey.

Here we are in the cold, dead of winter not knowing what to do. Snow conditions are bad, the cold has settled in and you're sitting around with nothing to do. Well this is a great time to grab you're summer gear and check it all over. Start with you're fishing reels: clean and adjust them. Or if you have reels to repair, now is the time to send them out to be fixed so that you will have them back in time to use for the spring season. Next go over you're rods: check for line wear. If there is some, you may have some bad eyes that are wearing out you're line. A good way to discover an issue is to use a

cotton swab and run it through you're eyes, if it catches or drags you have found the problem. Then you can have them looked at and possibly fixed or replace the rod.

Don't forget to look at you're tackle and straighten or put all those baits back where they belong so you will be ready when spring does finally come. Little things that you address now will make you're winter pass faster and have you ready to go come opening day.

Remember to take children out fishing and pass on what you know.

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Keeping You Posted

With the issuance of the "Lunar New Year: Year of the Rabbit" stamp on January 22, the Postal Service will launch a major step forward to enhance the customer experience with the expansion of the Forever Stamp program. All new First-Class Mail commemorative stamps issued in 2011 and beyond will be Forever Stamps. And, forever means forever. Forever Stamps can be used to mail a 1-ounce letter regardless of when the stamps are purchased or used and no



matter how prices change in the future. They never lose value. This convenience will allow customers to purchase a greater variety of their favorite stamp subjects and not have to worry about future price changesthey will be good forever. The Postal Service developed the Forever Stamp for consumers to ease the transition during price changes. Now that the Postal Service offers coils, booklets, and Holiday Forever Stamps, almost 85% of its stamp program is Forever.

The Key is the Core Health & Wellness by Dr. Ida Allen-Bergman

As we try to stay fit through these 'hibernation' months, concentrate on that midline! In my opinion, the most efficient way to get your body in shape is to do exercises that incorporate strength and resistance but that double as core training as well. Any time you are engaging your core, without even realizing it, your body gets extra conditioning. So whether you are out snowshoeing or just taking the stairs at the office, keep your stomach muscles tight! The workout below is no exception. If you keep your abs tight throughout these exercises, you will surely see that six pack sooner than you anticipated.

- 1. Warm Up: Jog in place for 3 mins, jump rope 2 mins.
- 2. Chair Dips: From a straight arm position dip down to shown position and raise back up. Do 2 sets of 6, move up to 8 when ready.



3. V-sits: Hold shown position for 20-30 seconds. Perform 3 times. You may need to use a blanket or pillow to support your tailbone.



4. Front Plank: Hold position for 30-45 seconds and perform 2-3 times. Be sure to keep your body line straight.



4a. Raise one arm and the opposite leg and then alternate for an advanced plank.



PLUG INTO =

5. Cross Legged Crunches: Keeping chin to ceiling and elbows back, perform small crunches concentrated in your lower abdominals. Do 2 sets



6. 2 mins of jumprope.


7. Ball Pushups: Do as many as you can. If you can only bend your elbows slightly and straighten back up, that's a good place to start. You will progress from there.



8. Squat Jumps: Keeping your abdominals tight, squat down to the shown position, and pop up around 6 inches off the ground. If you are not ready for the jump, start with just the squat and then raise to a straight leg position. Perform 2 sets

9. Cool Down by stretching thoroughly.

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Bird Feeding Nature Notes by Peter Dring

Many people feed the birds in the winter, in fact many feed them all year long. Most feeder birds are relatively easy to identify, some however can be a bit tricky. Those birds covered here are only the most common and likely to be visitors to your feeders. That being said it is quite unlikely that you will see all of them in a given year.

We have two general groups of birds using our feeders in winter, the permanent residents i.e., Black Capped Chickadees and Downy Woodpeckers and the winter visitors ie. Pine Grosbeaks and Pine Siskins.

First we will look at winter finches they commonly include: Gold finches, Purple Finches, Pine Siskins, Redpolls, Evening Grosbeaks and Pine Grosbeaks. Finches typically have heavy conical beaks except for the Siskin which has a more slender all purpose beak, it is brownish and boldly striped all over and may show some yellow in the wings and tail. It is our smallest winter finch.

The Goldfinch is slightly larger has dark wings with a white or beige wing bar and no body striping. The Redpoll is the same size as the Goldfinch about 5 inches long, is heavily striped like the siskin but has a red cap and a black bib. In win-

ter there is not a lot of sexual differences between the male and female of these three.

The next largest is the purple finch at 51/2 to 6 inches and the males and females differ considerably. The female and the young of the year are heavily stripped and you should look for a dark jaw stripe and a dark ear patch. The male has little or not striping and is a pleasant raspberry red color.

The last two winter finches we will cover are the Evening and the Pine Grosbeak. The Evening male is about 8 inches long, a yellowish gray color with black and white wings and a black tail. It has a dark head with a beautiful vellow forehead and over the eyes. The female is a dull non-descript yellow-gray with black and white wings, it sort of suggests a large Goldfinch.

The Pine Grosbeak male is large 8-10 inches rosy red bird with dark wings having 2 wing bars. The female is graygreen with dark wings, both have rather long tails that are notched as do all the finches.

I won't go into detail on the Black Capped Chickadee, our most common year round resident however if you live near a bog keep your eye out for a chickadee with a brown cap and brown on the body as we also have the Boreal Chickadee.

The White and Red Breasted Nuthatches are next. The white breasted, the larger of the two has a white breast, the cap, black (in the male) or gray (the female) ends above the black eye and there is no eye stripe. The Red Breasted is about one half the size, has a reddish breast and an obvious eye stripe. Both have gray backs and are usually seen coming down the tree trunk. I would be remiss if left out the Brown Creeper, not a real common feeder bird but it hangs out with the chickadees. Look for a small, well camouflaged, striped brownish bird with a long tail held tight against the tree trunk and a white eye stripe. It is usually seen searching the tree for insects, insect eggs or the grubs. You will have to look carefully for this one, it will be climbing up the tree.

The two common woodpeckers found at winter feeders are the Downy and the Hairy. Their plumage is almost identical with the hairy half again as large as the Downy, easy if they are seen together. If you see only one compare the beak length with the diameter of the head, the Downy beak is about half the diameter while the Hairy's is

about the same diameter.

We have both Crows and Ravens in the Northwoods and while the crow is a common bird at feeders the Raven rarely comes in. The Raven has a noticeably heaver beak and a "ruff" about the neck. In flight the crow will show a wedge shaped tail while the Raven's is rounded. Two more members of the Crow family include the Jays, the Blue and the Gray. The Blue Jay is so common I won't describe it as we all should be familiar with it. The Gray is not nearly as common, it is gray on the back with a white cap, throat and forehead, and black on the back of the head. They make the most interesting sounds and their flight is best described as soft. One bird you

may confuse with the Gray Jay would be the Northern Shrike. It has a black mask, black wings and tail and a faintly barred breast. This is a VERY aggressive bird of prey, with a hawk like beak that visits your feeder only to kill and consume the birds found there.

We occasionally have a Mourning Dove that over winters in the Northwoods, nothing really resembles them and they are almost always found feeding
