Northwoods Blizzard Blast Announces Event Schedule

The Northwoods Blizzard Blast Event Committee has announced the event schedule for the upcoming winter festival to be held Saturday, February 19th, at the Conover Community Park. All proceeds from the event benefit northwoods area Fire and EMS Departments.

Billed as "Winter Fun for Everyone," activities are from 10:00am-4:00pm. Admission and events are free for spectators. Single event tickets will be available for purchase for those who want to participate.

Recliner Races, Ice Bowling, and Slap Shot Hockey events, along with open skating, will be held on the ice rink. Hot laps happen throughout the day, while Recliner Race finals happen at 2:30pm; winner gets the \$100 prize. Prizes also awarded for Slap Shots and Ice Bowling.

The adjacent baseball diamond will be home to the Firefighter Challenge Competition, Dogsled Dash, and the popular Candy Flurry, which

sound off. Giant Ski Races cross the outfield, while teams of four challenge one another to ski together in sync and stay upright on one pair of 18' long custom made skis.

On the south end of the park, Chilly Charlie's Children's Carnival area features winter-themed games with prizes awarded. Kids may try their luck at Snowman Pong, Ring Toss, Find my Buttons, Pin the Nose on the Snowman, and Chilly Charlie's Challenge. Children will also enjoy Snow Art Fun, using nature's own materials to create colorful art in the snow. Set up in the new park rec facility, talented artists will delight the children with colorful face paintings.

Event participants will find open sledding on the popular sledding hill at the south end of the park, along with demonstrations in archery and snowshoeing nearby. Loading near the park pavilion, horse drawn sleigh rides depart the park every 15 minutes and travel

through scenic forest lands. Pony rides will happen during 45-minute windows beginning the top of each hour.

DMV Offers Free ID to Vote

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) has information and services to help people obtain identification, free of charge, that is valid for voting. The department urges residents needing an ID to start the process now to have identification in time for the Wisconsin 2022 Spring Primary Election on February 15th.

Valid identification for voting purposes includes a driver license, identification card, military or student ID card, etc. There is no separate "voter ID." A federally-compliant REAL ID card is not required for voting purposes. Anyone unsure if their identification meets the requirements should visit the Wisconsin Elections Commission website to check.

To obtain identification to show at the polls for voting, begin online at wisconsindmv.gov/idcards. If the required documents needed for an ID are not readily available, DMV has a process, called the Voter ID Petition Process, to obtain the necessary information. This process, available free of charge, can be used to quickly obtain a receipt valid to take to the polls for voting, while the remaining documents or verifications are obtained.

Mark does not describe the three separate acts of temptation by the devil, which are shared in Matthew and in Luke's accounts (Matthew 4:1-11, Luke 4:1-13). He emphasizes other things. First, he writes that Jesus is immediately driven out into the wilderness. Driven is a stronger term than simply being led. Driven implies that the one who is sending one out is doing so urgently or with haste, as if every moment matters. However, in Jesus' case, he is driven without violence. He was willing to go. Jesus is being drawn out without hesitation of any kind, rather than pushed into the wilderness. The purpose is for Him to be tempted. At this point, let's understand that Jesus' temptation here is the divine plan and purpose of God. It was not the brainchild of the devil. It wasn't that He contrived a way to get Jesus alone and thwart God's eternal plans. Neither was this a time for the Father to find out whether Jesus would pass the test, rather, this event (not exclusively,

there are others) was to prove that He was the eternal Son of God come in flesh. Jesus went into the wilderness under the guidance of the Holy Spirit...the devil came to him. Who is in control here really? Some folks believe that the enemy drove Christ into a corner and tempted Him. But, the facts show otherwise. God's perfect man with holy purpose – led by the Spirit, or as Mark expresses it, driven by the Spirit (drawn out and not by compulsion) - passes down into the wilderness and compels the adversary to stand out clear from all secondary causes and to enter into direct combat.

He did this to withstand temptation in flesh and blood. Why was Jesus driven forth to be tempted? Because, He was a man in every way. Let's understand that Jesus was sent out into those desolate parts to withstand what we fallen mortals can not, that is, resist the allurement of sin. Fact is, we are too willing to give ourselves to sin with little if no resistance. To be tempted, enticed, to prefer other things than God is as inevitable to all mankind. It is as certain as taxes and death. And, the way Jesus is a victor over that which mankind suffers under is to be made just like man and withstand temptation to sin as we are. The only way we will have victory over temptation to do evil is that one like us be tempted and overcome as we are; Jesus withstood the savvy lines of the serpent and trust in the eternal word of his Father.

Which brings us to this... in His obedience, Jesus demonstrates that He and His Father's will are in unison. He loves to do what is right in all ways. Jesus' resistance to temptation declares that God is good and greatly to be praised. In the throes of hunger and weakness as a man, Jesus naturally submits to the Word of God over all earthly power. If He was so tempted and triumphant, we too can have confidence when tempted, not in our own power, but the power of the resurrected Lord and savior Jesus Christ. The cross is where Jesus destroys the power of sin over His people. It is through the triumph of the cross that he delivers us from the guilt of sin and provides the power of the Holy Spirit to resist in triumph.

I leave you with this, "'For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who in every respect has been tempted as we are, yet without sin.' (Hebrews 4:15) For surely it is not angels that he helps, but he helps the offspring of Abraham. Therefore, he had to be made like his brothers in every respect, so that he might become a merciful and faithful high priest in the service of God, to make propitiation for the sins of the people. For because he himself has suffered when tempted, he is able to help those who are being tempted." -Hebrews 2:16-18 The Lord be with you, Pastor Frank Puffer. You may contact Pastor Frank at 715-

It's Valentine's Day! Now if you know me or have followed me, you may know that I am not much of a baker. NATURAL CONNECTIONS • Admiring Pileated Woodpeckers

Conversation hummed around the office as museum staff chatted with an old friend. I couldn't stay focused, though. Movement outside the office window had caught my eye, and it was too good to ignore. "Hey!" I broke in. "There's a pileated woodpecker outside the office window!"

These big, red-capped woodpeckers aren't uncommon in the Northwoods, but it did seem a little special to have one right outside. Conversation paused and we all turned to look.

With a body length of up to 19" and a wingspan up to 30", pileateds are the largest woodpeckers in the United States. Which is why it was a little odd that this guy was dangling almost upside down from some rather spindly boxelder twigs in a posture more suited to a chickadee. Sure, they only weigh 11 ounces, but that's still 22x what a chickadee weighs. Twigs bent and bounced as his big bill nibbled at something.

While the conversation began again, I kept watching. I could identify the woodpecker as male because in addition to his red crest, his mustache (scientists call it a malar stripe) was also scarlet. On females, this cheek stripe is black. But what was he eating?

Typically, carpenter ants and their larvae constitute anywhere from 40%-97% of a pileated woodpecker's diet, with beetle larvae, fruits, nuts, seeds, and even poison ivy berries rounding out the rest. None of those foods seemed logical for his current location. Golden-crowned kinglets find enough tiny caterpillars frozen onto winter twigs to fuel their 0.19 oz metabolism. Ruffed grouse get their energy from eating tree buds, but have a gizzard to grind them up and special bacteria to break down the cellulose. Boxelder seeds are toxic to horses, but have been reported as an emergency food for red squirrels. "Hey, buddy," I wanted to shout, "What's for lunch?"

Most of the time, we see pileated woodpeckers on big, dead trees. First, they listen for the sounds of insects moving and chewing, then they use their chisel-like beak to excavate rectangular holes, or sometimes just shred an area of punky wood. Then, they extend their barbed tongue into the hole, use it to grab a 6-legged morsel, and retract it into their mouth.

With how noisy a woodpeck-

er's drumming can be, I'm a little surprised that they are still able to hear such quiet sounds. I suppose there are a couple reasons for this. First, their loudest drumming is reserved for communication. When you hear their resonant tapping echoing through the forest, that's a message to other pileateds that a pair is defending a territory. While pileated woodpeckers defend the same territory all year, they are less vocal about it in the winter. Feeding happens every day, of course, but feeding is usually much quieter and sounds like dull thuds-if you're even close enough to hear it.

Second, woodpeckers don't just use their tongues to extract prey; tongues also protect their brain by wrapping around the back of the skull. A Y-shaped bone called a hyoid apparatus helps support the tongue and helps it extendand also acts like a seatbelt for the brain. Even the structure of their beak is important. The upper half of a woodpecker's beak is longer, but the bone inside extends farther into the lower beak. The lower beak ends up taking more of the impact and transferring force to the body instead of the noggin.

In addition, woodpeckers have less space and fluid between their brain and their skull. While this may seem counterintuitive, it

helps reduce movement of the brain during pecking-the same type of movement that gives humans a concussion in a fender bender. All of these adaptations help protect the woodpecker's brain and hearing while they pound on trees.

It's easy to find evidence of pileated woodpeckers feeding this time of year. Piles of wood chips accumulate under trees where pileateds are active, and even their past exploits

are more visible without leaves in the understory. Weathered snags perforated by woodpecker feeding holes are always fun to see. They illustrate well the meaning of the woodpecker's genus name Drycopus, which comes from the Greek for "tree cleaver."

So, whether you spot a pileated dangling awkwardly from twigs or pounding away at a trunk, I hope you pause your
